Pat (spotted in the Co-op) says thank you to Wendy – your tip worked!

"During lockdown one of the (many) places that I missed visiting is the Norfolk Wildlife Trust reserve at Hickling Broad. This is a wonderful, large area immediately adjacent to Hickling Broad and comprised of extensive reed beds with some broad-leaf woodland. In recent years it has become famous for the colony of common cranes, and possibly more about that next week.



But for this week's newsletter I want to show you another celebrated inhabitant of Hickling and that's the Bearded Tit, and also something I learnt about them this week. Bearded tits are reed bed specific. The first photo is the classic pose of a male bearded tit clinging to a reed and the drooping black



'moustache' for which they are named is clearly visible. I remained in the same

area for a while and caught glimpses of some young bearded tits rummaging around near the base of the reeds and eventually was able to get a few photos. What surprised me on a closer look was that one of the youngsters had 'white' eyes and another had 'black' eyes (see photo). Initially I wondered whether I had perhaps photographed a bearded tit with some other species, but on searching through my bird books I found the explanation. As juveniles, the female has a black iris and the male white. As they mature the iris of the female becomes whiter until there is little if any difference in the eye colour between the sexes - as they say, one learns something new every day!" **David**
